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SouthWest Victoria Alliance meets to discuss regional environmental issues

I had the pleasure of recently attending and presenting on a Q and A panel at the SouthWest Victoria Alliance – Regional Induction Day, hosted by Warrnambool City Council.

It was a great opportunity to talk about the key strategic issues and opportunities for the region in front of all the new local government councillors that have recently been elected. Local governments included Warrnambool City Council, Corangamite Shire, Southern Grampians Shire Council, Moyne Shire and Glenelg Shire.

I was also joined by Amber Clarke from neighbouring Corangamite CMA and we both spoke to the challenges of climate change impacts especially along our coastlines, particularly sea level rise, extreme events and floodplain management and planning.

Freshening up the Glenelg

The Glenelg River will receive a spring fresh with the delivery of additional flows in the waterway.

Flows have been running into the Glenelg since November 7 delivering compensation flows for landholders and the river.

This pulse of water, known as a fresh, will be released over 16 days to help reconnect sections of river, top-up deep pools and flush out poor water quality.



A connected river supports the cultural values of the waterway, it also supports native fish such as Tupong and Estuary Perch migrate throughout the system and the improved water quality creates a flush of abundant water bugs (macroinvertebrates) which become a food source for some of our favourite species, including Platypus.

These flows also ensure the river is in the best condition possible as we head into the drier months of the year, as the summer holidays attract many people to the river for boating, fishing, camping, bushwalking and swimming.

Once this fresh flow event has been released, environmental water flows will reduce to a 'baseflow' release which maintains connection and water quality.

Fresh facts

- A total of 2,100ML of water will be released during the fresh event. This will be made up of a combination of entitlements for passing flows, compensation flow and environmental water.
- Most of this release will be made from 5-mile and 12-mile outfalls. This will ensure the flows can reach as far downstream as possible. Previously announced flows are already flowing out of the Rocklands wall.
- The peak release rate will be 200ML/d for two days. This peak will start on Tuesday 26 November. The peak is expected to reach key towns on the following dates*:
 - December 4: Harrow
 - December 8: Dergholm
 - December 12: Casterton
 - December 16: Dartmoor

*dates are estimates and may be impacted by environmental factors.

• River height could rise up to 65cm as the peak makes its way downstream.

Technology and contractor partnerships battling weeds

From data capture to targeted spraying: How drones are doing the hard work on Country.

Woody weeds including Italian
Buckthorn, Gorse and Cape Wattle are
spreading around the steep rocky
embankments above a wetland
complex at Tyrendarra, but physical
access to control them across the
100ha site has been very challenging.
As part of the Budj Bim Connections
Flagship project we undertake targeted
weed control, and to help in this
situation, we turned to technology and
contracted Australian UAV to develop a
survey method to GPS reference and
map the location of each type of weed
across the site.

A multi-spectral drone was used to capture data in various light spectrums of each weed, and data from that was converted to a prescriptive spray file for Australis Biological to load into their DJI T40 drone for a very specific chemical application.

The end result is that technology and some pretty handy contractors have combined to protect this significant site within the Budj Bim Cultural Landscape without anyone tumbling down an embankment, or non-target species being impacted by chemical application.

Community information session on where the Portland bats fly

Over the last 12 months, researchers from the Arthur Rylah Institute have been GPS tracking the Southern Bent-wing Bat around the Portland area to find out where they go each night. Residing in the caves in the aptly named Bats Ridge, the tracking of the bats will show how far afield they fly to forage for food and help us understand where we need to make sure they have food available.

Predating on moths, our project, aims to understand where the bat flies, how many moths are around for it to eat, and where we should be revegetating with moth-friendly plants in our catchment.

Want to help the little bats? Snap the moths so we can map them!



One of the easiest ways people can help support the Southern Bent-wing Bat is by helping us understand what sort of moths and insects are currently in their home ranges and you can even do it while the cricket is on!

It is really simple – it just takes a second or two to snap a photo of the moths you find at your own back or front door! If you have moths that flutter around your house lights, grab a photo of one landed and upload it to the iNaturalist app! The iNaturalist app is free to download from the app store for your apple or android phone and will even suggest identification of the moths so you don't even need to know what you are taking a photo of!

Drought support for SW farmers in dry seasonal conditions

The Victorian Government has announced the \$13.53 million package to help farmers in 11 south west Local Government Areas of Glenelg, Southern Grampians, Warrnambool, Moyne, Corangamite, Colac Otway, Surf Coast, West Wimmera, Ararat, Pyrenees and Golden Plains who have experienced the lowest rainfall on record over winter, which has impacted stock and harvest and putting pressure on feed and water. Eligible farmers will receive up to \$5,000 as a cocontribution grant to support water infrastructure upgrades to pipes, tanks, troughs, dams, stock containment areas, and grain and fodder storage.

Glenelg Hopkins CMA Hamilton office temporary closure

The Glelelg Hopkins CMA Hamilton office will be closed for renovations from December 2, 2024 to allow for much needed building renovations to take place.

"Our building on French Street is pretty aged and requires an update to be more user friendly and a more occupationally safe workspace and to do that our staff are moving to a hybrid working model while the renovations are being completed," Glenelg Hopkins CMA CEO Adam Bester said.

Local building firm, Ultrabuild, has been selected as the preferred tenderer for these works following a competitive tender process. Builders will be onsite from December 6.
